Objectives:

- To help students gain factual knowledge about career opportunities in different biology professions and the steps needed to enter those professions.
- To help students develop skills and competencies that will aid them to undertake preprofessional activities and to apply to a professional school.
- To help students learn to find and use resources about biology professions and about the application processes for professional degree programs.

Course Description

This course will provide students information about professional careers in biology and about the processes for applying to professional degree programs. The format of this course will involve presentations by biology professionals and classroom discussions as well as out-of-class assignments. A major goal is to enable students to be stronger candidates for entrance into a professional degree program by gaining a broader understanding of different professions in biology and of the educational and other requirements for specific degree programs.

Assignments

A. Class participation/In-Class Assignments (120 points).

The success of this course depends upon your participation during the presentations by the guest speakers. Participation will be assessed by attendance and completion of in-class handouts. Students are expected to attend each class and to be prepared to contribute appropriate comments and questions to class discussions.

B. Out-of-Class Assignments (60 points).

You will complete four Out-of-Class assignments for this course, each about 1-2 pages.

Plagiarism

Plagiarism includes knowingly "representing, by paraphrase or direct quotation, the published or unpublished work of another person as one's own in any academic exercise or activity without full and clear acknowledgment. It also includes the unacknowledged use of materials prepared by another person or agency engaged in the selling of term papers or other academic materials." The penalties for plagiarism are severe. They include warning or reprimand, grade adjustment, probation, suspension, expulsion, withholding of transcripts, denial or revocation of degrees, and referral to psychological counseling.

Sexual Harassment

Sexual harassment is defined by the Affirmative Action/Equal Employment Opportunity Commission as any "unwelcome sexual advances, requests for sexual favors, and other verbal or physical conduct of a sexual nature." Withdrawal Policy and "I" Incomplete Grade Policy
